DAVENPORT HOUSE MUSEUM TO HOST ANNUAL HARVEST LECTURE VIRTUALLY

SAVANNAH, GA – October 26, 2020 – The Davenport House Museum will host its annual Harvest Lecture, *Mobility in America's First Planned City: Understanding Slave Badges and Enslaved Autonomy on the Southern Landscape* at 6:30 p.m. November 16 via Zoom. This year, Dr. Torren Gatson will speak on municipally issued badges used by free people of color and enslaved workers in the antebellum south particularly with regard to Savannah.

The Harvest Lecture Series is presented by the Davenport House Museum as a community service and an opportunity for enrichment on topics related to its mission.

Torren Gatson completed his Bachelor's and Master's degrees from North Carolina Central University and his Ph.D. from Middle Tennessee State University. Gatson is a trained public historian and a scholar of U.S., southern history, with an emphasis in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries African American built environment. He is a historic preservationist who conceptualizes the impact of African American material culture on the physical and cultural landscape.
